SUMMER READING**



This packet contains the grade level guidelines for book selection. Also included for each grade level are the ways a teacher will assess summer reading. If a project or paper is required, the details for those assignments are listed under the grade level. We encourage you to take advantage of the free books available through your local public library. Students who live outside Mecklenburg County may use the Public Library of Mecklenburg County if they show their student identification.

UFCA personnel have not read all of the books on the suggested reading lists. We have, however, read reviews and have tried to recommend books that are wholesome and rewarding. At times, reviews may not reveal all that the Christian community may consider inappropriate; therefore, we recommend that families read together. Reading with family members benefits students in several ways. Students more fully retain information that is discussed. In addition, students can ask questions about unfamiliar concepts or vocabulary and can discuss how the book fits into a Christian worldview.

Grades TK-K

There is no required reading list for grades TK and K, but we have included a suggested **reading list** to provide guidance. Early readers should be read to regularly. Early and emergent readers need books suited to their developing reading skills. A reading log is enclosed to record the books you read this summer. Bring the reading log/rating sheet with you when you come the first day of school.

Grade 3

Rising third graders are required to read Frindle by Andrew Clements and complete one of three projects described on the third grade summer reading project sheet. In addition, students should record the books they read this summer on the enclosed **Summer Reading Log for Grades TK-5**. The reading log and project are due on the first day back to school. For additional reading, the summer reading list can also be accessed through the Spaghetti Book Club at spaghettibookclub.org under the Grades 3-4 section.

Grade 3 Assignment

Read the book Frindle by Andrew Clements. Select one of the three projects below and bring it to school on the first day.

Option 1:

Design a poster that Bud Lawrence might use to advertise pens with the word “frindle” imprinted on them.

Option 2:

Design a product with the word “frindle” on it. Bring your new product into class. Be ready to give a short commercial about the product you created.

Option 3:

Pretend you are a TV news reporter. Write a story about Nick and the word “frindle.” Be prepared to give your newscast using your story for your class.

Grade 4

Fourth grade students are required to read Because of Winn Dixie by Kate DiCamillo. After reading the book, create a “Summer Reading Collage” following the directions below. For additional reading, the summer reading list can also be accessed through the Spaghetti Book Club at spaghettibookclub.org under the 3-4 Grades section. Please read three books this summer. The collage is due the first day of school.

Grade 4 Assignment

A collage is a group of pictures arranged in any way that fits on paper. This collage will use pictures to explain where the story takes place, who are the most important characters, and what happened in the book.

Materials Needed:

- Sheet poster board (white or color)
- Markers
- Pictures cut from magazines, newspapers, etc.
- Glue

Instructions:

1. Divide the ½ sheet poster board into 3 sections.
2. Write the title of the book and its author at the top of the poster board. Place pictures in each section that identify the part of the story:
 - a. **Setting** – the time (year, season, days/weeks) that the story took place and the location (town, city, country, homes, south, north, hills, swamps, mountains, etc.)
 - b. **Characters** – find pictures that look like 3 of the major (most important) characters in the story (hair style, types of clothing, shoes, belts, tall, skinny, short, large, etc.)
 - c. **Plot** – find pictures that explain what happens in the story (an argument, a wedding, searching for something lost, being a friend, moving to a new place, adventures, hiking, etc.)
3. On loose leaf paper (neatly written), or types in 12 pt. font, answer the following questions in complete sentences. Once the writing assignment is complete, glue it to the back of the paper.

- a. Where did the story take place? Give the time (when) and place (where) most of the story happens.
- b. Write the names of 3 important characters in the story. Write a description of each one that tells what the character is like (happy, sad, scared, adventurous, intelligent...) and what each looks like (red hair, green eyes, freckles, tall...)
- c. Using 5 to 7 sentences, tell what happens in the story. Was it an adventure? Was it a mystery? Was it true to life? What happened? What was the most exciting part of the story?

Fifth Grade Summer Reading

Summer 2018

Each incoming fifth grader is expected to read **Out of My Mind** by Sharon M. Draper and complete two related activities at home. First, after reading each chapter you are required to write a few sentences about what you have read (main idea). Please use 3x5 ruled index cards rubber-banded together. Use your neatest handwriting and write in complete sentences with proper spelling, capitalization and punctuation! We will use your note cards for the activities planned during the first week of the new school year (make sure your name is on them). Second, make a poster or a 3-D model of a fish bowl (which is very symbolic in the novel). In the fishbowl, include at least 3 items the main character would include in the fish bowl. Write an explanation as to why you included those 3 items.
